'I think that before I start I should just mention that Whybra Baldwin died last week. Whybra was the wife of the late Ivor Baldwin who was Town Reeve from 1974-75 and was also a town councillor - I am sure many of you have fond memories of Ivor and will wish to pay your respects.

Already I have attended several functions, the first at Red Lodge near Newmarket which was a great carol service and band evening and my first mince pie of the season.

My intention is to stage a concert on 1 July at St Marys Church for a Last Night of the Proms evening. Two soloists from the Glyndebourne Opera have already been secured and am awaiting confirmation from a band and a choral society. This is a real first for the Town and hopefully one that will be remembered for many years to come. I do hope I can count upon many of you to attend this function and inform others of the event.

I also intend to raise money with a couple of separate events for Bungay in Bloom as I feel the Town always looks its best in the Summer months and it is good to welcome visitors with a beautiful floral display during the festival in particular.
